Measurement. We like to use numbers as a form of measurement. rogram note

PRAISE GOD, ALL CREATURES

SAMUEL MARQUART

I composed Praise God, All Creatures as a celebratory piece honoring Dr. Fischer's 50 years of dedicated, heartfelt work at Concordia University Chicago. Through his inspiring music ministry, "Doc" has blessed me and countless individuals.

This piece not only serves to celebrate Dr. Fischer's jubilee year, but also reflects the most special moments in my life while in Wind Symphony. While the opening fanfare is meant to reflect my very first performance as a new trumpet player in the Wind Symphony, it is inspired also through the tradition of the Year of Jubilee. From Leviticus 25: "Then you shall sound the loud trumpet on the tenth day of the seventh month. On the Day of Atonement you shall sound the trumpet throughout all your land. And you shall consecrate the fiftieth year, and proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants." This proclamation is not just about any liberty, this is liberty that comes from God. For us today, this liberty is the gift of salvation through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Doxology is stated multiple times throughout the piece, through heavy brass and even through soft woodwinds, to

reflect the constant state of praise and thankfulness to our Lord for this incredible gift. God continues to provide through servants like Doc who gave me the Wind Symphony experience. For many people, this goes beyond the music. It is an experience that provides great discipline and focus-a beautiful way to express God's love, discover lifelong friendships and even fiancées. I met my future wife, who plays flute, in Wind Symphony (and Doc is a huge supporter!). This is reflected near the end of the piece when only one flute and one trumpet are playing in unison, the final phrase of the Doxology: "Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost." Like the end of every concert, there is always a surprise for the audience. Without totally ruining that surprise, I will say that after every concert we meet up in a circle as a group, pray, and continue to praise God with the Doxology. Speaking for myself and many others, thank you...you, Doc, for demonstrating your incredible Godgiven gifts, sharing your heart, for being a tremendous inspiration, and for these last 50 years.

WAYFARING STRANGER CHRISTOPHER NELSON

Wayfaring Stranger is a setting of the American folk spiritual known as Poor Wayfaring Stranger. While many versions of the lyrics to this tune exist, they all tell the story of a traveler who makes their way on a journey despite a rough road, difficult circumstances and gathering darkness. He does this, the lyrics say, for the promise of green pastures and a reunion with his father and mother at journey's end. This setting is intended to convey not only the difficulty experienced by the traveler, but also the resolve which is displayed as he moves forward despite hardship and disappointment. Wayfaring Stranger is offered as a sort of resolute battle-hymn for anyone who must endure a long journey of challenge and trial before the promised green pastures can be enjoyed.

Christopher M. Nelson is an educator, composer, arranger and percussionist. Currently, he serves as the Director of Bands at Timpangos High School in Orem, UT. Chris has performed with the Utah Premiere Brass and has recorded for the international television station BYU TV. He holds a Master of Arts in music performance with a conducting emphasis from Washington State University and a Bachelor of Music in instrumental music education from Brigham Young University in Provo, UT.

SAILING WITH WHALES ROSSANO GALANTE

As Sailing with Whales begins, a trumpet fanfare accompanies the men and women who leave port and set out to sea on a crisp morning to search for the majestic orca whale. The main theme, started by the trombones, follows them on their journey with these apex predators that no other animal would dare to prey on. This theme encompasses the thrilling search and, once found, subsequent trek with the whales in their natural habitat.

The noble and majestic secondary theme captures a quieter time on the ocean as these highly social whales travel in pods to calmer waters as the sun begins to set.

The next day, as the waves swell and the sailors try to keep up with the whales, the pace of the music accelerates to embody the speed of these ocean giants as they begin to move faster and faster. After a brief recapitulation of the main thematic material, the piece comes to a riveting, rhythmic conclusion, encapsulating the experience of Sailing with Whales!

Danzas Cubanas is a set of three original dancelike movements celebrating the joy and energy of Afro-Cuban music and people of this island nation. The closing dance is a fast-paced mambo. An excellent multi-cultural music experience, the three interconnected dances feature solos for piano, trombone, flute and trumpet.

SHALOM DANFORREST

As a choral work, Shalom alternates between sections of very simple melody floating over gentle accompaniment, setting the Biblical words of comfort and peace, with polyphonic refrains that feature the Hebrew word shalom (meaning "peace") weaving in and out between voices. No matter how complex the texture gets, it always returns to a single unison note, picturing the meaning of shalom: not merely a surface-level peace, but wholeness in every aspect of one's being (physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually) and in all our relationships with each other.

Transcribing the work for wind band provided much more opportunity for timbre and texture than the original choral version. I wish deep peace – shalom – to the musicians who bring this work to their audiences.

FLYING JEWELS JAMES M. DAVID

Flying Jewels is a symphonic poem for wind ensemble that attempts to capture the joyful and hopeful spirit of a famous essay by the late author Brian Doyle. The title refers to how Europeans described hummingbirds when first encountering them in North America. Doyle's essay muses on how intensely and passionately these tiny birds live their lives, with their hearts beating 10 times a second. He also considers the blue whale's giant heart, which beats as little as eight times per minute, and can be heard from miles away. Ultimately, the essay asserts the connection that all people and all creatures share: we all have one heart that carries us through life's struggles, victories and simple pleasures. My composition deals with the themes of Doyle's essay by depicting the heart rhythms of different creatures through various metric/tempo modulations and relationships. First is the hummingbird, flitting about with bright flourishes from the woodwinds and metallic percussion at superhuman speeds. A reptile's three-chambered heart is heard next with nods to the triple-meter dances of the Caribbean. At the center of the work is the human heart, which is a simple tune that slowly builds to a cadence at the heart rate of a blue whale: four giant chords that resound under the ocean depths. Finally, the work recapitulates each idea while gaining speed to combine all of the tempi in an exuberant and ecstatic finale. This work was commissioned by the United States Air Force Band, Col. Don Schofield, commander and conductor.

Wind Symphony

The Concordia University Chicago Wind Symphony has performed in 43 states, Canada, Europe, Asia and South Africa, and enjoys an unparalleled reputation among small liberal arts institutions. Since the Wind Symphony began touring internationally, they have performed concerts in Germany, the Czech Republic, Poland, Hungary and Slovakia. In May 2005, 2009 and 2013, the ensemble performed concerts in 10 cities in China, including Shanghai and Beijing. In May 2017, the Wind Symphony toured South Africa where they performed Johan de Meij's African Harmony, commissioned by the group especially for their tour. Additionally, the Wind Symphony has played major concerts at Carnegie Hall, Chicago's Symphony Center, the Meyerson Center in Dallas, the Weidner Center at University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, Uihlein Hall at the Marcus Center in Milwaukee, the Saginaw Civic Center, and the Lied Center for Performing Arts in Lincoln, NF.

The Wind Symphony has commissioned and premiered numerous wind compositions and produced 16 acclaimed recordings of sacred wind repertoire.

These recordings have been played on National Public Radio; WFMT-FM, the classical station in Chicago; The Lutheran Hour; almost daily on the Moody Bible Network in 40 cities throughout the United States; and streaming on Spotify. They performed to multiple standing ovations as the showcase ensemble at the New York City Wind Band Festival at Carnegie Hall in 2014 and 2019.

50th year as director of bands at Concordia University Chicago, River Forest, IL. Dr. Fischer conducts the Wind Symphony and University Band, and also teaches basic and advanced-level conducting courses. He holds the Bachelor of Music Education and Master of Music degrees from DePaul University, and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Michigan State University where he studied under Eugene Corporon.

Dr. Fischer and the Wind Symphony have performed concerts in almost every state in the United States and in Canada, Europe, Asia and South Africa. The Wind Symphony has had the honor of performing at many music festivals and conferences including the College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA), the Illinois Music Educators Conference (ILMEA), and numerous times at convocations of the Lutheran Education Association (LEA). Having performed to multiple standing ovations at Carnegie Hall in 2014, the Wind Symphony was honored to again be invited to be the showcase ensemble for the New York City Wind Band Festival at Carnegie Hall in March 2019.

Under Dr. Fischer's direction, the Wind Symphony has commissioned, premiered and recorded numerous wind band compositions, most notably the U.S. premiere of Johan de Meij's *The Lord of the Rings* in the fall of 1989. They have recorded 16 compact discs (over 150 works) of sacred wind music. The Wind Symphony's most recent recording, *Let My Love Be Heard*, features both sacred and secular music.

Dr. Fischer is in frequent demand as a presenter, guest conductor,

clinician and adjudicator in the United States, Canada, South Africa, Japan and Australia. In 1994, he was named to the "A Team" of University Professors by the Chicago Tribune. Dr. Fischer has been honored to present and guest conduct at local universities in Nagoya, Japan every December for the past four years. Since 2004, he has conducted the LCMS National Youth Gathering Wind Symphony seven times. In May 2018, Dr. Fischer gave the keynote address at the national convention of the Association for Concert Bands held in Buffalo, NY.

Dr. Fischer's professional affiliations include the College Band Director National Association, World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, National Association for Music Educators, Illinois Music Educators Association, and the National Band Association. He and his wife Kathy (Kolb BA '77) reside in River Forest, IL, and have three grown children: Joy, Julie and Jonathan.


