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INTRODUCTION

FAA---What It Is

The Fine Arts Academy is a week-long summer arts camp providing an opportunity for children to connect faith, creativity, and community with the intent and purpose of building their faith to glorify and serve God.

The Fine Arts Academy is for children who have completed Kindergarten through Grade 8, organized into three age-appropriate divisions: Primary (K-1), Intermediate (Grades 2-4) and Junior High (Grades 5-8). The FAA uses primarily *trained* teachers, both from the congregation and from the area public and private schools. The daily program includes core activities (music—choir and Orff, for example), a variety of electives (for the older children), an end-of-the-day chapel, and a closing Friday evening program. There is often a service project to help the children connect not only their gifts and faith but also the broader habits of the Christian life.

FAA----Benefits

There are many!

- For the <u>child</u> the mounting evidence of the power of music and the arts in cognitive growth and faith development is overwhelming. What a gift families and the Church have at their disposal!
- For the family one more effective tool for helping children develop into mature adults.
- For the <u>congregation</u> no cost (student registration fees cover costs including teacher stipends), A FAA complements other faith formation activities (like Sunday school, VBS). Students learn to assist in worship and the life of the parish. Good outreach tool.
- For the <u>teachers and staff</u> for public school teachers a chance to connect vocation and interests with their faith; for all staff a greatly rewarding experience.
- For the <u>community</u> what makes a community a great place to raise a family? Surely it includes opportunities to make friends, develop talents, celebrate!

STAFFING

FAA Director (or co-directors)

The FAA program is developed and administrated by a director in conjunction with a working board that meets monthly. The director's passion for Christ, the arts, and children is foundational for the program, as well as their abilities to be creative, systematic, and detailed in planning.

Director responsibilities

- Prays for the program and the academy community
- Develops and implements the yearly theme
- Coordinates and communicates with the host church, its staff and pastor
- Recruits the FAA board & administrative assistant
- Plans and leads the monthly board meetings
- Recruits, hires, and sets stipends for staff
- Recruits leader of the volunteer teen program
- Oversees the development of promotional materials
- Develops registration forms online and printed
- Schedules classes for each camper
- Orders the camp t-shirts with administrative assistant
- Plans and leads staff orientation
- Arranges for facility set-up and tear-down
- Organizes the closing program with the staff
- Develops feedback tools and reviews results
- His/her stipend (if any) is determined by the board

FAA Board

The Board is made up of several FAA staffers – the administrative assistant, theme teachers from each division, a visual art teacher, a music teacher, including someone from the church staff. It may also be helpful to have a member who is not a part of the FAA staff on the board, bringing expertise in other areas that might be beneficial to the program.

Board responsibilities

- Encourages and prays for the FAA community
- Monthly meetings with the director(s)
- Sets registration fees, deadlines, and registration process
- Sets criteria for scholarships
- Approves the budget
- Selects and develops theme, t-shirt design, promotional materials
- Develops a 5-day curriculum based on theme, including Bible references and a theme verse for the week
- Plans the 4-day chapel content
- Reviews current staff and contributes future staff recommendations
- Contributes to logo design and t-shirt choice
- Reviews FAA operating procedures
- Sets stipend for the director(s)

Administrative Assistant

(If your program is small, these tasks can be covered by some of the board members and the director. But as the program grows, this position will become essential and add efficiency.)

Administrative assistant responsibilities

- Takes notes at board meetings
- Develops the brochure, the registration forms (print & online)
- Handles mailings
- Helps with the scheduling process
- Prints nametags, door signs, & the student schedules which are affixed to their folders
- Purchases snacks
- Purchases folders for students
- Purchases basic materials (markers, crayons, paints, colored pencils, glue, glue sticks, etc.)
- Purchases pushpins, command strips, tape, staples, fish line, mat boards, etc. for Friday art display
- Purchases and assembles folders for staff orientation
- Prints schedules, guidelines, and other folder content
- Coordinates Day 1 Check-in
- Provides the Daily Check-in / Check-out lists
- Sends out daily newsletter with announcements during FAA week
- Serves as the office contact and camp nurse

Theme Teachers

FAA stands out from other fine arts camps, we believe, because of the quality of the teaching staff. The teachers' passion for Christ, passion for their art, and passion for teaching children are integral for providing the necessary ingredients of a creative, vibrant faith community during the FAA week.

Professional teachers from area schools (public and private) are a good resource for staffing. Because our emphasis is on process and not product, we are looking for teachers who already know how to structure their teaching time to provide the maximum value and know how to develop a week's curriculum. Most public-school teachers are unable to boldly proclaim their faith within the classroom, and so it is a joy for them to openly share Christ with the FAA children whom they might encounter again in the fall. Parents and former staff are the best resources when looking for new staff.

Of course, Lutheran pastors, teachers, DCEs are great possibilities for teachers as well, given their training in theology and education. They may be especially adept at unwrapping the theme Scripturally and connecting important Christian teachings.

And, many folks in the congregation may have the natural skills of connecting with children.

You may want to do background checks on all adults working directly with children.

75-80% percent of our budget covers teacher stipends. They are professionally trained and should be paid as professionals. The stipend is based on the number of classes that are taught daily. (For example: If the rate is \$150 per class and 4 of the 5 class periods are taught a day, the stipend at the end of the week would be \$600.)

Theme Teacher Responsibilities

- Prepare age-appropriate lessons & activities, centered around the main theme and the daily themes, using the Bible passages & Christian teachings provided
- Responsible for developing four 50-minute classes and one 40-minute class for the week
- Work together with the other theme teachers, sharing ideas and teaching strategies
- Higher level thinking and varying styles of learning are encouraged

Music Teachers

Music is a mainstay in the life and mission of any Lutheran church and, so, is a core component of a FAA program. In our program, all children participate in daily Choir/Orff classes. No matter where one worships, all of God's people sing. Through this class we hope to encourage all to become more confident in using their own voices to praise God. It also helps to promote community spirit and reinforces the theme as we sing together each day. This also provides each child with an active role in the closing program.

Our use of Orff instruments and methods provides an outlet for those who might find 50 minutes of choral singing to be a trial. Using body percussion, chant, and movement based on the theme, can then be transferred to tuned and non-tuned percussion instruments. This provides one more opportunity to reinforce thematic ideas while praising God. Plus, it's another way to just have fun while working together. If you do not have qualified Orff teachers in your area, other music options are possible and just as valuable.

Music Teacher Responsibilities

- Select and teach, and sometimes create, music centered on the theme
- Provide age-appropriate instruction
- Provide 25 minutes of choral singing and 25 minutes of Orff-Schulwerk each day.
- Help locate and borrow Orff instruments which are graciously lent to us by public schools and other congregations
- Make sure accompanist is available
- Lead the children in singing at closing chapels
- Provide musical leadership for closing program

Elective Teachers

Each child in the Intermediate and Junior High Divisions takes the same five classes each day. Theme and Choir/Orff are taken by all students. Each student then selects three electives from those listed in the brochure. Electives can change from year to year depending on the theme, interest, and the teacher resources available. Below is a list of the many electives that we have offered over the course of 20+ years:

Handbells, Hand chimes, Harp, Ukulele, World Drumming Drama, Mime, Readers' Theater, Radio Theater, Videography, Puppets

Lyric Dance, Hip Hop, Movement (primary only)

Drawing, Painting, Watercolor, Mixed Media, Textile art, Collage, Mobiles, Mosaics, Woodburning, Pottery, Weaving, Woodworking, Paper making, Gourd art, Scrapbooking, Sculpture, Calligraphy, Paper Quilling, Basketry, Batik, Photography

Sneaker Design, Jewelry/Beading, Needlework, Chrismons, Knitting, Sewing Culinary art, Creative Writing, Bookbinding

Some electives are designed for Junior High students only.

For about 120 students in the Intermediate and Junior High groups, we offer 15-18 electives, with the classes containing 5-12 students each. This provides for great one-on-one instruction.

Elective Teachers Responsibilities

- Create age-appropriate curriculum for the week
- Procure their supplies and/or provide a supply list for purchase
- Provide a list and receipts for reimbursements due on Wednesday of that week.
- Set up and clean up classroom area
- Return classroom to original state on Friday afternoon
- Prepare artwork for exhibition and display in art gallery on Friday, if applicable
- Provide props, music, etc for closing program, if applicable
- Do not teach the theme, but are encouraged to incorporate it in some fashion within the elective

Teen Program Director

As the academy grew in size, a Teen Program was implemented, providing service and leadership opportunities for high school youth. The number of volunteers that you require will depend on the size of your program. For 150-160 campers, 12-15 volunteers are sufficient.

Teen Program Director Responsibilities

- Helps recruit teen volunteers
- Helps keep volunteers motivated and focused food and snacks always welcome ☺
- Acts as a conduit for teachers and director needs
- Plans and assigns daily tasks
- Provides a daily teen Bible study on the FAA theme

Teen Volunteers

- Provide invaluable help in the set up and tear down process, by hauling tables and chairs, assembling folders, dispersing supplies, and aiding the various teachers as they set up their rooms.
- Provide indispensable leadership during the hour lunch break

Plan, lead, and participate in recreation activities

Supervise lunch area

Clean up lunch area

- Provide meaningful and often hilarious skits/videos for some of the daily chapels
- Provide smiles, energy and a spark between classes
- Supervise and clean the snack room
- Serve as role models; many of our campers return to be teen volunteers
- Help with the technical needs of closing program and chapels
- Help with special projects
- Often instrumental in promoting and administrating the service project for the week.
- Available to help elective teachers if needed.
- Provide the before and after care for children whose parents need the longer day to accommodate
 work schedules. The extra fees charged for before and after care are passed on to the teens who come
 early and/or stay late. Two teens are needed for each care period. Funds are distributed at the end of
 the week.

PROGRAM

Theme

All children participate in a daily theme class appropriate for their age level. Theme classes present the faith content and theme for the week in a variety of teaching methods, encompassing different learning styles (visual, auditory, reading/writing, kinesthetic). Within the five-day format, our goal is to dig a little deeper, broaden their understanding, and encourage them in their faith journeys. Included is a list of the many themes that we have used:

Snacks

Prepackaged snacks and water are provided in a snack room during each of the passing periods. This room is supervised by our teens.

Each camper is allowed one snack a day whenever it is convenient for them to stop by the room. However, we have been known to bend the rules especially for growing teens and preteens.

Most of our campers bring backpacks and water bottles. We do not allow snacks to be eaten in the classrooms.

Lunch/Recreation

All students bring a sack lunch which is collected during the morning check-in according to their division, and then transported and provided at the appropriate lunch time and venue. (By the teens, of course). Lunch and Recreation happen at the same time so that one division is eating while the other division is at recreation.

We have discovered that the students who attend FAA are more enthusiastic about participating in group games that build community. Our students have enjoyed "Minute to Win it" as well as relays, water games, or human foosball. "Wacky Wednesday" (fun, theme-based activities) can also build community.

Teachers also bring their lunches and meet together in the staff lunchroom (which at times may also contain yummy snacks). This has become the staff gathering place. The lunch hour for the teachers has proven to be a great time to exchange FAA information, start the planning for the closing program, and create great friendships among the artists. A short devotion and prayer time can also be included.

Service Project

The students may take part in a service project during the week. This can be an outgrowth of the theme. Examples include new or gently used books for homeless shelters, canned foods, etc.

AGE GROUPINGS

Primary Division

The primary division at Cornerstone's FAA is comprised of children who have completed Kindergarten and Grade 1. They do <u>not</u> choose electives like the Intermediate and Junior High Divisions, but participate in a wide variety of classes throughout the day. The enrollment in the Primary Division has always been limited to two classes of 15 students each. This helps to maintain a learning atmosphere that enables the building of relationships. Two teachers for each group provide, teach, and reinforce the theme material throughout the day and accompany the students to their various classes. (See below for sample schedules)

Intermediate and Junior High Divisions

The intermediate division is comprised of students who have finished Grade 2 through Grade 4. The Junior High Division is made up of students who have completed Grade 5 through Grade 8.

Their day consists of five classes: Theme, Choir/Orff and 3 electives of their choice. They keep the same 3 electives all week.

All classes are 50 minutes in length, with 25 minutes for lunch and 25 minutes for recreation. We provide 10 minutes of travel time in between classes, giving our youth time for a bathroom break and a snack in between classes. Because our facilities are rather large, teens are in the halls making sure everyone arrives where they need to be on time. (See sample schedule below)

CHAPEL

Chapel provides a time to reinforce the theme. It's an opportunity to review the songs learned in Choir by the whole Academy (teachers included), hear a short message on the day's theme by a pastor, have fun, and hear announcements. It can be a bit crazy at times and also very profound. Often some small take-home item is provided at the final chapel on Thursday that reinforces the theme. In the past we have sent home a sending cloth, a small compass, mirror, glow stick, solar glow-in-the-dark beaded bracelet, etc.

At the end of Chapel, the children retrieve their lunch boxes and their parents sign them out using the Check-out lists before taking them home. Those who are in the after-care program meet the two teens who provide a snack, play games, watch videos, etc. until their parents arrive. No after-care is provided on Friday.

SCHEDULING

We have not been able to find scheduling software that fits our needs. There are just too many variables and considerations---

- What is the age range within the elective class? It is difficult to teach and difficult for the students if there is one 7th grader in a class with five 3rd graders.
- What is the ratio of boys to girls?
- Often 2 or 3 friends want to be in the same classes
- Choirs are grouped by Division.
- Some classes (like an advanced photography class) might only be offered once during the day.

So...we use the "sticky note" method. Each Intermediate and Junior High student is assigned five small sticky notes. Each one has their name and one of their classes on it. We use colors to denote their division and sometimes denote whether they are the youngest (finished 2nd grade) or the oldest (finished 7th and 8th grade). As a result, we often use four colors.

Five large tables are marked with the time of the class (9, 10, 11, 1, 2). Large sheets of paper are labeled with the name of the classes and eventually are placed on the tables denoting the time of day. (After many years, we determined that Intermediate Choir is at 9 and 1, Primary Choir is at 10, and Junior High Choir is at 11 and 2).

From the registration data on the computer, find the classes with small enrollment that will only be offered once. Schedule those children first and then proceed to the classes that will be offered only twice. Place the sticky note with the child's name and class on the sheet marked with that class name, and then place the large sheet of paper on the table at the determined hour. Keep adding sticky notes and large papers to the tables.

As you schedule, have someone on the computer enter into a spreadsheet each child's schedule. Having someone who understands how to work with spreadsheets is a HUGE blessing, especially when printing nametags and printing out schedules which we attach to the front of each child's folder.

Plan on taking most of a day to complete the scheduling and utilize 2—3 people to accomplish the task.

FRIDAY SCHEDULE AND THE CLOSING PROGRAM

On Friday evening, FAA hosts a closing program showcasing what the students have learned over the past week. An art gallery is set up to display the visual arts, and the children share what they have learned in Choir and Orff, along with the other performing arts classes (e.g. dance, drama, handbells, ukulele etc.) Display cards for the art gallery are prepared in advance by the admin assistant.

To help the closing program run a bit more smoothly, we shorten each of the class periods to 40 minutes on Friday, with an hour for lunch, allowing us to have time at the end of the day to coordinate the logistics for the closing program. All children participate in the closing program.

During that time, the theme teachers and other elective teachers are on hand to help with supervision and also to take notes that will help get the right groups to the stage area at the proper time. The program is informal. The children and the parents are reminded that perfection is not expected in a week, but rather the focus is on learning and enjoying the process. It is a time of sharing – not performing. The key words are: "process over product."

Meanwhile, the visual arts teachers set up the artwork display in the "gallery" (vestibule, narthex, hallways – whatever is available). Make sure to include whatever hanging products are needed – pushpins, command strips, fishline – within the supplies for the week. Also think about matting board or other background needs.

It is very hard to keep our students (and parents) out of the gallery area when the students are released to go home at 3:30 on Friday but allowing the teachers to complete the gallery set up without interruption is important. Not all art is displayed in the gallery. Make sure the extra art goes home Friday at 3:30.

Remind the parents to not remove gallery art until after the program is finished. Also make sure that all teachers have time to enjoy the fruit of their labors. Between 3:30 and 5 PM, the teachers clean up their individual rooms and help with over-all clean up, including resetting the rooms for Sunday morning.

A light catered supper (think Chick-fil-a or Chipotle) is provided for teachers, teens, and staff families at 5 PM on Friday. FAA pays for the staff's suppers. The staff member pays for any extra family attending. It provides a time of fellowship, a time for thanks, celebration, and congratulations, a time to hand out the stipend checks, and a time to cover any last-minute instructions for the closing program.

**Make sure to ask your staff to stay after the program to help with the program clean up so that it doesn't fall to a few people after a very, very long day.

TUITION, BUDGET, SCHOLARSHIPS

TUITION FAQs

1. Why should I pay this much money for my children to attend when they can go to VBS for a minimal fee or for free?

Compare FAA to other community camps and sports camps. What are their fees? Compare the FAA staff who are professional teachers, not high school or college students, with little or no experience in working with children. Publicize the qualifications of your staff!

2. Do you offer scholarships?

Discounts are offered for families sending more than one child to the academy. Discounts are offered to the children of staff members.

Partial and full scholarships are offered to those demonstrating need.

About 5-10% of our income goes to scholarships.

- 3. How do you determine the amount of tuition?
 - A. Will you use an all-volunteer staff and keep the price low or pay professional teachers?
 - B. Research the fees associated with other camps in the area. Are they full-day camps or half-day camps? What do they provide for their tuition?
 - C. Estimate how many children might attend and how much tuition you might charge.
 - D. Multiply the projected number of student times the tuition cost.
 - E. The bulk of tuition goes toward salaries/stipends as in any organization about 75%.
 - F. How many theme teachers and elective teachers will you need? Will they teach a full day or a partial day? Will 75-80% of your income cover the stipends? Don't forget to include stipends for the director, the admin assistant, and the teen program director.
 - G. The rest is for student/staff supplies and publicity costs. Think about adding a materials fee for those electives that are expensive like jewelry, scrapbooking, woodworking, culinary. Because this is a fine arts camp, do not scrimp on the quality of your supplies and monitor the quality of your products.
 - H. Look for donors who would be willing to sponsor scholarship students (MOPS, Bible class, small groups, voters' meeting, etc.)

GETTING STARTED

(Remember that this handbook reflects a mature program, developed over 20+ years. You will probably want to begin smaller and gradually expand over time.)

- 1. Prayer is essential! Often the Enemy will try to stop ministry in its early infant stages---think of Moses' obstacles or Mary and Joseph's flight to Egypt. As in any ministry, God provides the strength, insight, creativity, and provision needed. Pray with others who are like-minded. Ask others for prayer.
- 2. Begin talking to people about the program. Begin to think about who your teachers/artists/leaders could be. Gather as many ideas and supportive people as you can. This is not a one person-led program.
- 3. Form a working board of teachers, parents, artists, and church staff to begin working together.
- 4. Discuss who your audience will be. Whom are you are looking to attract? Describe them culturally, spiritually, and educationally. How will this affect your goals, your electives, and the content of your teaching?
- 5. Don't be afraid to begin small. The first FAA at Cornerstone consisted of 30 students and 10 teachers. We now *limit* our registration to 150-160 with 30 on the staff, mainly due to the constraints of the closing program space.
- 6. Begin planning a year in advance if at all possible. Cornerstone's FAA month-to-month planning list is provided below. It can give you a starting point for your own planning ideas.
- 7. If you are interested in a half-day program, you might consider shortening the class periods to 45 minutes and offering only two electives instead of three. A sample schedule is listed below:

9:00 – 9:45	Class 1
9:50 - 10:35	Class 2
10:35 - 10:45	Snack
10:50 - 11:35	Class 3
11:40 - 12:25	Class 4
12:30 - 1:00	Chapel

- 8. Decide where and when you plan to hold the program. Reserve the space and the dates early to avoid conflict with other summer programs at your church, such as VBS.
- 9. Speak with the leadership of your church early and often as you proceed with your plans. If you plan to use the pastor(s), make sure the dates of FAA are on their calendars early.

Host a theme teacher workshop

Start to work on the chapel plans

Finish up a FAA Bulletin Board or display with pictures from previous year

MARCH

Process registrations; send out confirmation cards




